FROM THE EARLY HEAD START DIRECTOR

Greetings,

We are on a brighter path! I believe many would agree that 2020 was a very difficult year for everyone across our country and the world. The lockdowns, mask mandates, loss of life, economic crisis, and all that came with the pandemic will remain etched in our lives for years to come. In addition, we experienced the pain and divisions from an extraordinary election cycle and faced head on the very public outrage and realities of racial and social injustices in our society. The pervasive instances of racism and violence captured on television and social media, reminded us there is still much work to be done. Still, we as a program and community stood in solidarity. We have a great responsibility to address the individual needs of all families and their children. Our commitment will always be to provide quality and equitable educational services to our youngest learners and their families.

As the lockdowns were initiated in March 2020, the Early Head Start program moved all services remotely. Home visits, parent committees, socializations, and policy council meetings were offered through zoom meeting spaces. It took some time to adapt to this major change but overall staff and families endured. This new norm was only strengthened by the commitment of staff, families, and community providers working together to support each other.

During the summer of 2020, Capitol Region Education Council (CREC), offered ACES Early Head Start the opportunity to be a partner in their newly awarded federal grant expanding services to include center based classrooms to 3-5 year olds in 3 different locations of Middlesex County. As a result, ACES officially opened a head start site at Snow Elementary School in Middletown, one at Valley View Elementary School in Portland, and one at the former CRT site at the American Legion in Clinton. These classrooms would not be possible without the support and partnership with Middletown Public Schools, Portland Public Schools, and the American Legion in Clinton. In the initial months of this expansion, we changed our name to ACES Early Head Start and Head Start Services. We now serve 60 children and families in the home visiting program and serve 55 children in the center-based classrooms.

We are grateful for the support and funding we received from ACES to help with PPE and guide us through the many measures necessary to mitigate and protect our staff and families. COVID related relief funds at the federal level also contributed to our ability to reopen offices and subsequently the classrooms at the three locations.

Our community partnerships including our longstanding relationship with Middlesex Hospital have helped engage and provide resources to families with technology, diapers, masks, books, educational materials, gift cards, food & nutrition, and referral services related to health and wellness throughout the year. As the director of this program, I must express my sincere gratitude to our home visitors, teachers, managers, specialists, consultants and administrative staff for their dedication and optimism during this extraordinary year.

As always, our doors are open to the greater Middlesex County community. We are eager to work with you and thank you immensely for the ongoing support.

FISCAL YEAR 2020 EXPENDITURES

The EHS budget is separated into 3 categories:

- 1. **OPERATIONS**, which are costs related to the day-to-day management of the program, including staff salaries and costs to support services to families.
- 2. TRAINING & TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE, which are costs related to the training of EHS staff.
- 3. **NON-FEDERAL SHARE**, which are in-kind donations or services received from third parties or contributed by the agency during the program period. Total must equal 25% of federal award, unless a waiver is applied for an approved by the Regional Office.

This report reflects funded enrollment, funding sources and activities for ACES Middlesex County Early Head Start Partnership for the fiscal year January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020 in accordance with Head Start Act 644(a)(2).

CHILD HEALTH OUTCOMES

EHS is not interested only in the children enrolled in the program, but in the entire family. We ensure that families have quality information on good health habits and offer workshops and in-service training. Our staff assists families in obtaining the most up to date physicals and vaccinations, and link families to dental services in the community.



of enrolled children were **up-to-date** on a schedule of age appropriate **preventive and primary health care**, **and oral health care**, according to the CT Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic, and Treatment (EPSDT) schedule for well child care.

PREPARING CHILDREN FOR KINDERGARTEN

ACES Early Head Start developed nine school readiness goals for the 2019-2020 program year to align with the five central domains of the Head Start Early learning Outcomes Framework (2015):

- Approaches to Learning
- Social and Emotional Development
- Language and Literacy
- Cognition
- Perceptual, Motor, and Physical Development

Observation data was collected by home visitors in the home and during socialization experiences, according to the objectives in the Teaching Strategies GOLD Assessment Tool (TS GOLD) for infants and toddlers that align with the School Readiness Goals.

The growth data in this report reflects a subset of children with sufficient data across three program checkpoints in the 2019-2020 program year (September 2019 – August 2020). Children displayed overall growth in all areas and age ranges. The percent of growth for each dimension is listed along with the number of children included in each. Larger percentages generally reflect a smaller number of children assessed for that indicator.

APPROACHES TO LEARNING: GROWTH

• Our infants and toddlers will begin to demonstrate interest, curiosity, persistence and eagerness in exploring the world around them.



SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT: GROWTH

- Our infants and toddlers will begin to develop the ability to express and manage emotions in appropriate ways.

- Our infants and toddlers will begin to demonstrate receptive and expressive language skills and communication strategies in their home language(s).
- Our infants and toddlers will begin to learn and demonstrate how print works, and engage with stories and books.

- Our infants and toddlers will learn and begin to use math concepts during daily routines and experiences. (1 year and up)
- Our infants and toddlers will begin to use all of their senses to process and explore their environment and demonstrate the ability to remember and connect new and known experiences in their environment.



PERCEPTUAL, MOTOR, AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT: GROWTH

 Our infants and toddlers will begin to develop and strengthen control over large and small muscles.



ASSESSMENT TOOL CHANGE FOR 2020-2021

During our 2019-2020 Winter cycle, we piloted the ChildPlus Desired Results Developmental Profile (DRDP) assessment and made the full switch to using that assessment for the 2020-2021 program year.

The DRDP is a child assessment for children birth through age five, developed in California as part of their technical support system. ChildPlus is offering this assessment as part of their information system, providing all child data in one system. This assessment better suits our needs and allows for more parent-friendly reports that are informative as well as easy to understand.
