# FROM THE EARLY HEAD START DIRECTOR

Greetings Middlesex County,

During the 2021, funding year, ACES Early Head Start maintained full enrollment for the majority of the year and exceeded the 10% mandate for enrolling children with disabilities (part C eligible). Clearly, it has been a difficult time in our country as the pandemic continues to affect the lives of many in our community. Throughout this time, ACES continues to provide all the necessary resources and safeguards to ensure children, families, and staff are safe and healthy. This included providing COVID home test kits and the most up to date national and local guidance on the virus. I am particularly grateful to our staff for their perseverance as we navigated through the challenges of keeping this virus under control and away from homes and offices.

As reported annually, the most recent ACES financial audit dated December 2021, had no findings for Early Head Start. Back in July 2020, ACES entered into a partnership with Capitol Region Education Council (CREC) to operate three Head Start classrooms in Middlesex County. These classrooms were located in Clinton, Portland, and Middletown. In 2021, ACES decided to focus on the two classrooms located in Portland and Middletown. Along with our community partners from Portland Public Schools and Middletown Public Schools, we successfully provided comprehensive, quality services to children 3-5 years at Valley View Elementary and Snow Elementary.

The clear path to in person services was scary for families as well as staff. Thanks to the flexibilities by the Office of Head Start, we offered our services in a manner that respected families comfort levels.

Early Head Start welcomed a new Family Service Specialist and worked hand in hand with many new Head Start staff throughout the year. As I write this letter, I want to also take the time to announce some significant changes to the program structure. Most recently, I transitioned into a new role at ACES. I am now the Director of Special Programs and Community Engagement. This is a position which allows me to have a cabinet position within the ACES Executive Leadership Council. In my view, I see this as an opportunity to improve representation of the head start options and other ACES services. It is not every day I would consider such an opportunity but definitely saw the larger benefit of having a stronger voice at that level. I want to assure Middlesex County of my commitment to stay involved in the work. This means that a new Program Coordinator will need to oversee the daily program operations of Early Head Start. With that said, we can now officially announce Heather Granja will serve in that capacity.

Once again, I would like to thank our community partners, the ACES Governing Board, Policy Council members, families and staff for their ongoing support ensuring we had another amazing year.

# FISCAL YEAR 2021 EXPENDITURES

The EHS (Early Head Start) budget is separated into two categories:

- 1. **OPERATIONS**, which are costs related to the day-to-day management of the program, including staff salaries and costs to support services to families. This also includes **Training & Technical Assistance**, which are costs related to the training of EHS staff.
- 2. **NON-FEDERAL SHARE**, which are in-kind donations or services received from third parties or contributed by the agency during the program period. Total must equal 25% of federal award, unless a waiver is applied for an approved by the Regional Office.

This report reflects funded enrollment, funding sources and activities for ACES Middlesex County Early Head Start Partnership for the fiscal year January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021, in accordance with Head Start Act 644(a)(2).



EHS is not interested only in the children enrolled in the program, but in the entire family. We ensure that families have quality information on good health habits and offer workshops and in-service training. Our staff assists families in obtaining the most up-to-date physicals and vaccinations, and link families to dental services in the community.

96%

of enrolled children were **up to date** on a schedule of age-appropriate **preventive and primary health care**, **and oral health care**, according to the CT Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic, and Treatment (EPSDT) schedule for well childcare.

# PREPARING CHILDREN FOR KINDERGARTEN


ACES Early Head Start developed nine school readiness goals for the 2019-2020 program year to align with the five central domains of the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework (2015):


- Approaches to Learning
- Social and Emotional Development
- Language and Literacy
- Cognition
- Perceptual, Motor, and Physical Development

During our 2019-2020 Winter cycle, we piloted the ChildPlus Desired Results Developmental Profile (DRDP) assessment and made the full switch to using that assessment for the 2020-2021 program year. The DRDP is a child assessment for children birth through age five, developed in California as part of their technical support system. ChildPlus is offering this assessment as part of their information system, providing all child data in one system. This assessment better suits our needs and allows for more parent-friendly reports that are informative as well as easy to understand.


The growth data in this report reflects a subset of children with sufficient data through the 2020-2021 program year (September 1, 2020 – August 31, 2021). The DRDP assessment compares children to themselves with growth being determined by an increase in scoring bands. The bands are as follows: Responding Earlier, Responding Later, Exploring Earlier, Exploring Middle, Exploring Later, Building Earlier, Building Middle, Building Later & Integrating Earlier.













# LANGUAGE & LITERACY DEVELOPMENT: GROWTH














# COGNITION, INCLUDING MATH AND SCIENCE: GROWTH









# PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT: GROWTH







